

Jown memory lane

I joined this college in June 1953 for the first year commerce class and left the college in 1960 after getting M.Com Degree.

The admission process in those days was very stringent. Admission forms were given only to those who have secured more than 60% marks in S.S.C. Board Exam. Out of 900 forms given, only 450 students were admitted after personal interviews. There were only three divisions of 150 students each.

Some periods were conducted in the building of J.J.school of arts, next to V.T. Railway Station and some classes were held in Sukhadwala Building, near Excelsior Cinema in Fort. We were required to commute between these two places every day till 1955 when the college was shifted to the new building at Churchgate in 1955.

The professors were all men of repute in the field of commerce and economics. During my stay in the college, we were having Mr. Muranjan, Mr. Dhongade and Mr. K T Merchant as principals.

After getting my M.Com Degree, I worked as a professor in commerce, accountancy and economics for four years in colleges affiliated to Pune and Shivaji University.

Further, for 3 years I worked in a Private Machine Tool factory as GM. for about three years. Thereafter I joined Maharashtra state road transport Corpn. as years of service (MSRTC) divisional account


officer and after twenty-seventherein, I retired as Manager, Finance.

I can still remember vividly that rainy, June morning in 1974 when I walked into the Sydenham College of Commerce & Economics, feeling completely lost!

After having opted for Science in school and getting admission into science colleges of my choice (not to mention skipping First year), I got emotionally blackmailed by my mother to opt for Commerce and do the 4-year drill! Considering all my school mates were in Science or Arts colleges, I was left to fend for myself in this strange environment. But it helped to know that I was entering the best Commerce college in India, and I must admit it was an early life lesson in adapting to newer environments and embracing change

For me, like for many young students, college is probably the most defining time of your life. The overarching belief of 'having come of age' and the friends and memories I hoped to make kept me on a real high! And I am very happy that some of the friends I made on Day 1 are still very close to me. I soon came to realize that everyone is looking out for friendship and the Canteen was the place to cement those friendships over the famous samosas and tea. The long corridor on the ground floor became our favourite hang-out between & after lectures and no one seemed to be in a hurry to get home. But a very dear friend who had a visual disability and was with me almost daily till her parents fetched her in the evenings from my home taught me how much we get from giving and at that time I could not imagine how this would change my future course completely. I would spend time reading to her topics that were taught that day in class. So while it was a revision for her, I too benefitted hugely. And it made me feel that you can't help another without helping yourself in the process too.

Sydenham College had some of the finest professors... Variava & Marchante (as he pronounced his name!) for law, Kazi & Hemadi for English, and the likes of Bansi Mehta & Ghatalia for accounting kept us in the classrooms more than expected. Vibrant co-curricular activities gave students amazing opportunities to unleash their hidden skills. But undergrad was more about having fun and being with friends. It was only when I joined the post graduate management program at Sydenham that I could see myself getting serious and planning my future. I had been influenced by some good teachers in my student life and while doing my post grad (classes were from 1pm-8pm) I was offered a short teaching assignment in New Era School for their Class 12 as the Accounts teacher had some sudden medical issue. And if there are some topics I am still proficient in it is only because I was so nervous that I prepared thoroughly before my class. And that is when I decided that at some point in the future I would go into teaching!

Marriage, a stint at corporate life and two lovely children later I decided that some introspection was required.

I had opted for Finance but what I really enjoyed was developing youth potential. And so I went back to teaching, thanks to a chance meeting with Dr. Indu Shahani, a professor at Sydenham during my time in college but later the Dean at another college. And during my 11 years teaching at the BMS program and finding ways to bring out the shine in students, I discovered the magic of Social Work. In fact all students who participated in our social initiatives showed remarkable multi-tasking abilities and were the preferred choice of recruiters. I had flashbacks of how good I felt as a student reading to my friend everyday and during exam time and was convinced that if we had to develop youth to become "good" managers & business leaders, we must make them good humans first. And Social Service was the path to this transformation.

What resulted was my moving out of full time teaching to set up a non-profit, Chirag Rural Develoment Foundation that provides solar solutions to rural Indians who live in darkness post sunset.

And engaging urban youth in this project is an important feature. This turned out to be a unique adventure involving student power, corporate muscle, hard core rural work and the alchemy which spread light and transformed lives – in parts of Bharat that needed to catch up with fast-developing India. Our formula for these neglected villages include solar home & street lights, safe drinking water, solar water lifting for agriculture, solar micro-grids for village industry, power for engaged learning in rural schools and a greener India on the one hand, and a more sensitized, fulfilled and purpose-driven group of youth and corporates on the other. We have Project Chirag Chapters in schools & colleges and youth ambassadors across the globe where it is a win-win for all. And alongside I continue to pursue my first love, teaching, as a visiting faculty at B-schools in the city. Because I feel strongly about how some teachers had shaped me, I believe teachers have a very significant, lifelong impact on their students - our role as educators is to guide students through spirit of social service, fire them in the crucible of hard work, mould them into the process of continuous learning, to emerge through this process of Alchemy as Human Resources as good as gold.

Aim of the Campaign:

Cancer is one of the most deadly diseases in today's time. As per the records of 2019, 18 million new cases are reported annually. Cancer is the second cause of death globally, accounting for an estimated 9.6 million deaths or one in six deaths worldwide whereas in India it is estimated that 1 in 9 Indians will develop cancer during their lifetime. The club took this opportunity and fulfilled its duty towards society by creating awareness and breaking myths about cancer.


Live Hair Donation by a 5-year-old:






Our Guest Speakers:




The session was graced by Dr. Ian Pinto one of the top oncologists of Mumbai. He is an oncologist and a blood specialist. He has trained and worked in the US for the last 15 years at centers like Memorial Sloan Kettering cancer center, New York University, State University New York, and Columbia. He has published and presented both nationally and internationally. Currently, he is a consultant medical oncologist and hematologist in Mumbai at Breach Candy Hospital, H.N. Reliance Foundation hospital, Jaslok hospital, and St. Elizabeth hospital. He is also the chairperson of the Rotary Cancer Aid Committee for the Rotary Club of Bombay.



Mrs. Mathew spoke about her experiences as a cancer survivor and the Noble work of an NGO. She spoke about the ups and downs she faced and also specified the importance of a 'Chemo buddy'. She presented a PowerPoint on breast cancer awareness how to identify it and emphasized how early detection can lead to killing cancer before it kills us. She also broke various myths about Cancer.

The second speaker for the event was Mrs. Premi Mathew, the founder of Hair for Hope, India and Protect your MOM campaign and a stage two cancer survivor. Mrs. Mathew is a Finalist of Emirates Woman Award 2011 and the Winner of the Dwani Award, UAE. Hair for Hope is an initiative to encourage hair donation and conversion into wigs for economically challenged cancer patients to give them the courage to fight the disease. Hair for Hope, India has inspired over 9000 hair donations and made hair donation a movement in India. Protect your MOM campaign is a breast cancer awareness campaign based on Facebook and has involved over 100,000 students from some of the best schools and colleges in UAE and India. Mrs. Mathew was chosen as one of the top 100 women achievers in India.
